A Living Sacrifice

Driven by God's Spirit, the Apostle Paul said this: "Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God--this is your spiritual act of worship. Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is-- his good, pleasing and perfect will." (Romans 12:1-2).

One Day at a Time

Paul knew avoiding a small life means making the right commitments to God and keeping them one day, one month and one year at a time. That's why every January 1st I renew my commitment to the Lord. I evaluate the previous year and set goals for the new one. I encourage you to take some time over the next few days and consider where your life is headed. Make commitments which will enable you to live a big life in the middle of God's will throughout the year.

Here are four daily commitments I'll make:

1. Time in God's Word. For the last 95 months I've read through the four Gospels every month. It takes ten minutes a day and exposes me to Jesus in fresh ways. Each month I learn something new and amazingly, I never get bored.
2. Time listening to God and praying for others.
3. Affirm my family and bless those I encounter.
4. Maintain purity of thought and deed.

Of course, these disciplines don't make us grow. God does! But they create a setting in our hearts where God's grace will transform us throughout the year.
