The women stepped inside (Lu 24:3).
Two remained there,
staring at the vacant stone slab (Lu 24:3).

Mary saw it too,
and the shock sent her running (Jn 20:1-2).
Her first thought wasn't resurrection,
but loss, "They've taken Him."

So she raced to the disciples,
leaving the others inside.
And in the moment
we first hear of the empty tomb,
we're left with the same question
the women faced:

If Jesus isn't here,
what happened to His body?

No explanation given.
No understanding.
Just an empty place,
an angel on a stone,
and the quiet hint
that something greater
is unfolding.

You may not know this about Jesus,
but the stone wasn't moved
so He could get out.
It was moved so His disciples
could get in.

The open tomb
isn't an escape route.
It's an invitation.
