a sinner with nothing to offer God (Lu 18:9-14).

Like that humble man,
the Kingdom opens for us
in the place
where we admit our need.

Jesus begins His sermon
with the ones who know
they bring Him nothing-

because only empty hands
can receive the King
and the fullness of His Kingdom.

Will I bring my poverty to God
instead of my pride.

God meets me
not in my strength,
